Preschool Sunday School Lessons, Phase 1 - Lesson 31
Gardens in Heaven (*Spiritual Experiences 5665*)

Theme: Children in Heaven

I. Underlying Ideas for the Teacher

- A. There is no death, for life is eternal.
- B. People don't really die. The Lord wakes them up in the spiritual world after a short sleep. He gives them spiritual bodies that can live in heaven, and they don't need the bodies they had in the world any more.
- C. There are 3 parts of the spiritual world: heaven, hell, and the world of spirits. Good people go to heaven. Bad people go to hell. And the world of spirits is the place in between heaven and hell where people stay for a while before they go to heaven or hell.
- D. When children die, they are taken to heaven. They grow up in heaven and live there forever.
- E. Children in heaven are given angel mothers and teachers who care for them and educate them in the ways of heaven.
- F. Children in heaven look to the Lord as their heavenly Father.
- G. Children in heaven have little gardens in which the flowers fade or grow more beautiful according to the behavior of the children.
- H. The Lord takes special care of children in heaven, and He does everything. He can lead children on earth along the path toward heaven.

II. Story Circle

- A. Introduce the Story
 - 1. Do you know what happens when a person dies? The Lord takes him to the spiritual world. He doesn't really die; he sleeps for a while, then he wakes up in the other world! If he is a good person, he will go to live in heaven. If he is a bad person, he will want to live in hell.
 - 2. Do you know what happens when a child dies? The Lord takes him to heaven and gives him an angel mother. The angel mother loves him very much and takes very good care of him. The child will grow up in heaven and become an angel. He will live in heaven forever, and he will be very happy!
 - 3. Today we are going to learn more about children in heaven. Here is a story about a little boy living in heaven.

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B. Tell/Read the Story

1. Read the attached story, "The Lost Lamb."

C. Ideas to Discuss

1. What did Joshua lose? (his pet lamb)
2. What did Joshua do in the morning? (Ate breakfast, prayed, heard a story from the Word, made a picture, sang songs, straightened his bed-room, weeded the garden, played with his brothers)
3. Where did Mama take them in the afternoon? (To the park)
4. Why didn't Joshua want to leave the park? (It was his turn to be the leader of the game he was playing.)
5. What bad thing did Joshua do at the park? (He threw a stone at a deer.)
6. Why couldn't Joshua find his lamb? (Because his lamb couldn't be with him when he was bad)
7. Who sent Joshua his angry feelings? (the evil spirits)
8. What happened when Joshua was sorry? (His lamb came back.)

D. Further Ideas

1. Did the story tell you something about life in heaven? Joshua has an angel mother and her husband to take care of him. The Lord made them a beautiful house to live in with gardens and a nearby pond (small lake). Joshua has two brothers, and each boy has his own room with a bed, a dresser, and a closet. The Lord gives them clothes, food, and wonderful toys to play with. Do you think Joshua likes living in heaven?
2. In heaven the Lord has many special ways to help a child learn to be good. Let's say a girl lies to her angel mother. She might find an ugly spot on her pretty dress that won't come out until she is sorry. Or perhaps a flower in her garden will droop and begin to fade until she is sorry. In our story, Joshua's lamb went away until Joshua was sorry. Now let's say a girl helped her angel mother very much one day. She might find a beautiful new dress in her closet—a present from the Lord. Or she might find a new, gorgeous flower growing in her garden. Sometimes children in heaven find a shiny gold coin as a reward from the Lord.
3. The Lord wants every child to go to heaven someday. He takes special care to help you learn to be good. You don't live in heaven, so you don't have special gardens, shiny coins, lambs and other things to help you. But the Lord gave you parents to help you. And last time we talked about the two guardian angels that are always with you. Best of all, the Lord talks to you in the Word, and He watches over you all the time!

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III. Enrichment Activities

A. Music

1. "Every Child in Heaven Has a Garden Bright," *Hymnal* #149.

B. Activities

1. Use a fresh flower and a drooping flower as props to show what would happen in heaven if a child:
 - a. Helped someone (show fresh flower)
 - b. Said something mean (show drooping flower)
 - c. Wouldn't share his toys (show drooping flower)
 - d. Thanked his angel mother (show fresh flower)
 - e. Said the Lord's prayer (show fresh flower)
 - f. Took something that wasn't his (show drooping flower)

NOTE: This may also be done with a stuffed lamb appearing and disappearing, but unlike the other things mentioned in this lesson (gardens, coins, spots, new clothes), the lamb's disappearing is not taught in the Word, but is a logical extension of other teachings.

C. Project: A BEAUTIFUL GARDEN IN HEAVEN

1. Motivation
 - a. Tell the children that the gardens in heaven are more beautiful than any here. The flowers sparkle in the sunlight. Some of the flowers have gold or silver on them, and others look like jewels!
2. Procedure
 - a. Use crayons, markers, or oil pastels to make a flower garden on white drawing paper.
 - b. Tell the children to cover the page with flowers and use all of their favorite colors.
 - c. Add silver and/or gold glitter to make the flowers more like the ones in heaven. Perhaps you could glue sequins or "diamonds" (clear beads from a craft store) to some of the flowers.
3. Optional
 - a. Give the children a sticker of a lamb or cotton ball "lamb" to put in the garden to remind them of the story.
