## NOAH'S ALTAR

The Lord provided that Noah and his family, and all the animals in the ark, would survive the flood. Then they would multiply and spread all over the earth. Spiritually, the good people who survived this flood of evil that swept over the earth and destroyed the Most Ancient Church were saved by the Lord. This was so that the human race would continue, as it does today.

The first thing that Noah did was very important. He had just gotten out of the ark. He must have been very happy. He must have been deeply thankful that the Lord protected him throughout the flood. So the first thing Noah did was to build an altar and burn offerings on it to the Lord. This was the way he knew to worship the Lord and praise Him.

However, this was not the way people first began to worship. In the Golden Age, during the time of the Most Ancient Church, when all people were good, they worshipped on the tops of mountains and in groves of trees. And so he did not see how everything in nature was a symbol, a representation, of the Lord, the church and heaven. But the Lord made it so that Noah could still worship the Lord. The Lord told Noah all that he needed to know to worship Him. And so, Noah built an altar out of stone, and burnt sacrifices on it. And when the people saw the smoke of the sacrifice rise up, it reminded them that the Lord was the Most High, their Lord and God.
