Lesson 12: THE LIFE AFTER DEATH – INTRODUCTION Micah 6:8

NOTE: This is lesson 8 from *Glenview Sunday School Curriculum*, Phase II, except that it is adapted for use with *Philip Learns a Lesson* by Clare S. Engelke.

I. Underlying Ideas for the Teacher

- A. There is no death, for life is eternal.
- B. Heaven is a wonderful place where good people go to live.
- C. Hell is a dismal place where evil people go to live.
- D. The world of spirits is where people stay for a while before they go to heaven or hell.
- E. It is the Lord's will that all people go to heaven, but He leaves us in freedom to decide for ourselves.
- F. The Lord will lead us to heaven if we look to Him and follow the teachings of His Word.

II. Story Circle

A. Introduce the Story

- 1. (Optional: Shut your eyes) Imagine a beautiful place: wonderful trees and flowers; great smells (use real fragrances--optional); gentle animals, beautiful people who are very nice and good; lovely homes for them to live in. You are imagining what heaven is like. Good people go to heaven.
- 2. Now imagine an ugly place, perhaps a swamp or desert. It smells awful. There are ferocious animals, and ugly people who are very bad. The people have shacks to live in. You are imagining what hell is like. Bad people go to hell.
- 3. There is a place between heaven and hell called the world of spirits. Let's imagine that. It's a lot like our world: plants and animals; houses and other buildings; some people who love the Lord; some people who love only themselves. People stay in the world of spirits for a while before they go to heaven or hell. The Lord gets their homes ready for them, and He gets them ready for their new homes.
- 4. Where do you think you would like to live, in heaven or hell? Everyone is happy in heaven, but everyone in hell is unhappy and frustrated. The Lord wants all of us to go to heaven so we can be happy.
- 5. Is it hard to go to heaven? What do you need to do to go to heaven? Let's read the Lord's Word to find out the answers.

B. Ideas for Presentation and Discussion

1. Micah 6:8: Write this quote on the board and discuss:

"He has shown you, oh man, what is good;
And what does the Lord require of you
But to do justly, To love mercy,
And to walk humbly with your God?"

Micah 6:8

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2. Discussion:

We all want to go to heaven, don't we? And the Lord tells us what we need to do if we want to make heaven our home forever. In our first reading, the Lord is telling us how easy it is to get to heaven. There are only three things He requires of us:

- a) to do justly (to be fair with people);
- b) to love mercy (to be kind as well as just; we shouldn't be harsh);
- c) to walk humbly with our God (to know that everything good comes from the Lord, not ourselves).

After focusing on the ideas in this outline, read "Philip Learns a Lesson," explaining that it's a story Swedenborg wrote about an incident he saw happen. (Philip Learns a Lesson is out of print, but we have attached it at the end of the lesson.)

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PROJECT: An Abstract Representation of Heaven, Hell, and the World of Spirits

From Glenview Sunday School Curriculum—Primary Level, Phase II, lesson 8

Supplies:

9x12 red or yellow construction paper gray or (pea) green torn tissue paper white torn tissue paper glue crayons

Description:

Abstract representation of heaven, hell, and the world of spirits:

- White tissue paper represents good people (in heaven & world of spirits).
- Gray (or pea green) tissue paper represents evil people (in hell & in world of spirits).
- Red or yellow background because (1) Lord's love is present with all, both good and evil; and (2) white tissue paper wouldn't show up on a white background!

Procedure:

- 1. Provide a background sheet of yellow or red construction paper and divide into thirds, representing heaven (top), world of spirits (middle), and hell (bottom). The red or yellow color of the paper is to symbolize that Lord's love is present with all, both good and evil!
- 2. Use torn pieces of white tissue paper to represent good people (in heaven & world of spirits).
- 3. Use torn pieces of gray or (pea) green tissue paper to represent evil people (in hell & in world of spirits)
- 4. Glue a combination of gray (or green) and white torn tissue in the center section to represent the world of spirits. Both good and evil people are there, having recently arrived from the world.
- 5. Glue white torn tissue (good spirits, angels) in the top section.
- 6. Glue the gray or green torn tissue in the bottom section to represent evil spirits in hell.
