THE LORD'S GREAT MERCY

Lesson: Genesis 4

The story I am going to tell you is about two brothers and the great mercy of the Lord. The names of the two brothers were Cain and Abel. They were the sons of Adam and Eve, who were the first man and woman the Lord created. Cain was the older son and Abel was his younger brother.

When these two brothers were old enough, they had to work just as their father Adam had worked when he was sent out of the Garden of Eden. Abel was a kind and gentle shepherd.
