WHY WE CELEBRATE CHRISTMAS

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What do you think about when you think about Christmas? Perhaps you think of a Christmas tree, all the pretty lights and balls. Perhaps you think about the presents you would love to get on Christmas day, the special things that you very much want. Or, perhaps it's the presents you're going to give. Maybe you think about Christmas dinner, a special feast, or maybe, when you think of Christmas, your thoughts turn to the really important things about Christmas.

You know why we celebrate Christmas. We celebrate Christmas because it's the Lord's birthday, a day which happened long, long ago, and has been celebrated by people ever since. You remember the wonderful story of Christmas, the story of Mary to whom an angel appeared telling her that she would be the mother of the Lord. What wonderful news the angel told her. But Mary wondered how it could happen, even as she humbly accepted the fact that it would happen. Joseph, when he heard the news, at first wanted to put Mary away. But then, in a dream, he was told about the birth of the Lord, the wonderful good news which later, when the Lord was born in Bethlehem of Judea, was proclaimed by angels, who spoke to humble shepherds, saying the words, "For there is born to you this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." Then suddenly there was with the angel a great multitude of angels all saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men!"

What wonderful news! The world at last was to come out of the spiritual darkness caused by selfishness, the darkness of falsity, and shine in the new light of the Lord's truth which He would tell all people.

For centuries people all over the ancient world had heard prophecies of this wonderful event. Many of their myths described the birth of God as a man. Some wise people in Syria, a land east of the Holy Land, had learned of His coming from their prophets. One of their prophets was a man named Balaam. Balaam told them that this special Savior would be born in the land of Judah, and that there would be a new star shining in the sky as a sign of this wonderful birth. So it was that these wise men kept records of the stars, looking carefully to see when the event might happen. Suddenly they saw a new star in the eastern sky and rejoiced because they knew it was a sign that the Savior had come. Immediately, the wise men wanted to see the Lord, so they prepared for their journey. You give special spiritual gifts to the Lord—just as precious to Him as the gold, frankincense, and myrrh the wise men gave—by doing nice things for other people. These gifts are the best Christmas presents you can give. Yes! Christmas is a special time. It's a time to think of the Lord. It's a time to think of the happiness the shepherds and wise men must have felt as they discovered the baby Jesus.
